The rugged and unspoiled landscapes of the Highlands of Scotland have resulted in some of the nation's most major engineering achievements in the field of transport as well as some of the most splendid castles amid magnificent surroundings. On a visit to this area, you'll soon see that artists and craft makers have long since taken inspiration for the remarkable land and seascapes to be found in this year.

A trip to the Outer Hebrides reveals the unique nature and character of these magical islands, from the medieval castle of Kisimul Castle, stronghold of the Clan Macneil on the Island of Barra to the Butt of Lewis Lighthouse, designed by David Stevenson on the Isle of Lewis. Uncover the secrets of ancient standing stones or discover the modern renaissance of Harris Tweed in today's fashion.

DAY 1 - ABERDEENSHIRE AND MORAY SPEYSIDE

Inverewe Garden and Estate, Poolewe – a lush, sub-tropical-style, oasis perched on a peninsula at the edge of Loch Ewe amid the rugged landscape of Wester Ross, Inverewe was created out of bare rock and a few scrub willows in 1862 by Osgood Mackenzie. It's full of colourful, exotic plants from around the world and is widely regarded as one of the most beautiful gardens in Scotland.

Glenfinnan Monument and Viaduct, Lochaber – made famous as part of the route to Hogwarts in the Harry Potter movies, the viaduct is an acclaimed feat of engineering.
