

Dark Sky Park – as well as being an excellent scenic spot to explore in daylight hours, Galloway Forest Park is the UK's first Dark Sky Park. It's one of the best spots in the UK to stargaze – even the Milky Way can be seen with the naked eye. The Scottish Dark Sky Observatory offers two impressive telescopes, and a roof observatory. Or book a bespoke stargazing experience with a UNESCO Biosphere Dark Sky ranger.



Logan Botanic Garden – often described as Scotland's most exotic garden. Built on land inherited by the MacDougal family from caretaker king John Balliol in 1295, the garden is very distinctive in that the vast majority of plants and trees come from the southern hemisphere, where they were collected by members of the family and plant hunters employed by them in the 19th century.


