

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Day 1 - Kingdom of Fife



Royal Burgh of Culross – Explore the cobbled streets of a beautifully preserved 17th and 18th century Scottish town. It has been used for many film productions including *The Little Vampire* (2000), *Captain America: The First Avenger* (2011), and *Outlander* (2014). Also visit Culross Palace and Garden.

Dunfermline Abbey and Palace – A place of Christian worship for more than 1,000 years. The Abbey is the resting place for many Scottish monarchs including Robert the Bruce. The Abbey features in the forthcoming film about the life of Robert the Bruce, *Outlaw King*.

Day 2 - Dundee



Tay Bridges – The impressive Tay Rail and Road Bridges are the most majestic ways to enter Dundee across the silvery River Tay. Dundee has been described by some as Scotland's city of poetry, its most famous poetic son William McGonagall is best known for his poem *The Tay Bridge Disaster*.



RRS Discovery – Built in Dundee, the Discovery took Captain Scott and Ernest Shackleton on the first expedition to Antarctica. Scott's adventures were immortalised on film in *Scott of the Antarctic* (1948). Step aboard the RRS Discovery to experience life as a pioneering adventurer.

Day 3 - Angus



Hospitalfield House – A centre for contemporary arts and ideas, this arts & crafts building is the former home of artist and collector Patrick Allan-Fraser and his wife Elizabeth Fraser. After a visit to Hospitalfield in 1813 Walter Scott was inspired to write his novel *The Antiquary*, modelling Antiquary's home on Hospitalfield.

Arbroath Abbey – Explore the substantial ruins of the Abbey founded by William the Lion in 1178 and famously associated with the Declaration of Arbroath of 1320 which asserted Scotland's independence from England. Featured in the film *Stone of Destiny* (2008) based on the real-life removal of the Stone of Scone from Westminster Abbey.

Day 4 - Perthshire



Scone Palace – Family home of the Earls of Mansfield and ancient crowning place of Scottish kings including Macbeth and Robert the Bruce. Tour the palace and see the painting inspired by the movie *Belle* (2013) and other treasures in the collection followed by a walk in the beautiful gardens and peaceful woodland.

Birnam – In Shakespeare's *Macbeth* the famous Birnam Wood, a great forest once straddled the banks of the River Tay. Blair Castle – Discover the ancient seat of the Dukes and Earls of Atholl and the home to Europe's last remaining private army, the Atholl Highlanders. A favourite place of Queen Victoria. Her visit was recreated for the TV drama *Victoria* (2017). Tour the castle, explore the gardens and grounds.
