Standing Stones of Stenness

The Stones of Stenness are part of the Heart of Neolithic Orkney World Heritage Site and make up a small circle dating from the third millennium BC. The Stones of Stenness today consist of four upright stones up to 6m in height in a circle that originally held 12 stones. The focus of the interior was a large hearth. The stones were encircled by a large ditch and bank, the form has been lost over time by ploughing.

Ring of Brodgar

One of the finest stone circles in the world, Ring of Brodgar is dating back to 2,500 BC. The stone ring was built in a true circle, 104 metres wide and originally contained sixty megaliths; today only twenty-seven of these stones remain. The reason for the creation of the Ring of Brodgar, which would have been a considerable amount of work in that time, is not known for sure, perhaps as an astronomical observatory, religious shrine or rituals.

Skara Brae

Uncovered by a storm in 1850, Skara Brae gives a remarkable picture of life 5,000 years ago, before Stonehenge was built. Explore this prehistoric village and see ancient homes fitted with stone beds, dressers and seats. A replica house allows visitors to explore its interior, while the visitor centre provides touch-screen presentations, fact-finding quizzes and an opportunity to see artefacts discovered during the archaeological excavations of the 1970s. There is a café and a well-stocked gift shop selling locally made souvenirs and crafts.

Buckland, to allow them to build a chapel on Lamb Holm, they were given two Nissen huts joined end to end to convert.

Jarlshof Prehistoric and Norse settlements

Located at Sumburgh Head near the southern tip of Mainland Shetland. This extraordinary site has a complex of ancient settlements which cover more than 4,000 years of human history. Broch of Mousa

Take your clients on a ferry trip to get to Mousa ("Mossy Island" in Old Norse) to see a RSPB Nature Reserve with important breeding colonies of seals and seabirds. Moussa is thought to be built around 300 BC, 13m in height and therefore prime example of pre-historic Scotland.

Broch of Clickimin

On the stunning shore of Clickimin Loch is an incredible example of a broch, a stone-built round house found only in Scotland. Clickimin Broch has evidence of settlement spanning over a thousand years. To the west of the broch tower are the remains of a number of different structures dating from around 1000 BC to 500 AD. This rare sculpture could date from the late Iron Age or early historic period and may be associated with kingship and inauguration rites.






St Ninian's Isle
