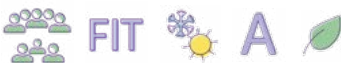


Riverside Museum

Take train from Glasgow Queen Street to Aviemore.
Distance between Glasgow Queen Street to Aviemore Train Station is 93miles/150km and takes approx 2 hours 30 minutes.
Distance between Aviemore Train Station and Rothiemurchus 1.3miles/2.09km (Transport can be arranged with Rothiemurchus in advance for 1-4 people. Larger groups can hire local taxis or coaches)
