Comunn Fachdraidh Nis is a visitor centre in North Dell. The centre boasts an extensive archive which includes information on individual families from the area, photographs, documents, video, sound recordings and extracts from other published material. People come looking for ancestors and answers to their past, which they find in the vast genealogical archives and the cemetery records dating back to the early nineteen hundreds. The refurbished accredited museum depicts island life along with artefacts and equipment from days past.

The Blackhouse, Arnol

The Blackhouse at Arnol is a traditional Lewis thatched house built around 1880 and gives visitors a special and authentic insight into island life. This traditional Lewis thatched house is fully furnished, complete with an attached barn, byre and stackyard. It was once the residence of a Hebridean crofting family and is preserved today almost as its last inhabitant left it, complete with a peat fire and open hearth. A furnished 1920s croft house is also open to view.

Pocket House Studio

Your clients can visit this ethical rug weaving studio and croft and try their hand at spinning, weaving and plant dyeing. Sit at a traditional wooden loom and feel the threads that link us with the weavers that worked in the old weaving shed for generations. The owners share their island life over a Highland tea.

The Calanais Standing Stones

Let your clients walk among the megaliths at one of Scotland's most magnificent and best preserved Neolithic monuments. The Calanais Standing Stones, located on the west coast of Lewis and famous all over the world, are an extraordinary cross-shaped setting of stones erected 5,000 years ago. They predate England's famous Stonehenge monument, and were an important place for ritual activity for at least 2,000 years. Please note that the visitor centre is currently closed until 2026 for refurbishments which results in no facilities being available at the site.
